All through history, we have heard and witnessed artists who have composed songs choreographed dances, or created visual art in response to joys or sorrows, injustice, war or peace, and many other reasons. During my high school years growing up in Jamaica, West Indies, the song "Let There Be Peace on Earth" was synonymous with every graduation that was held at Merl Grove High School. As we ponder the ACWC's theme for 2024, "DiffERent", may we all become more attuned to how we can help foster peace and make a change through the arts no matter our differ-

Different is the ACWC's 2024 theme and two very different exhibitions will kick-start the year's theme activities and programs. Local Color and Wooly Wonders exhibitions will open on January 12, 2024 and the public is invited to see individual artist's unique interpretations of the theme. Local Color is the annual member artists' exhibition that showcases the work of local and regional artists in our Perry Main Street gallery. We anticipate the theme will challenge our artists to create pieces that will be engaging and thought-provoking for all who will visit Susan Swanson - handwovern the show. Visitors will see a diverse range of media used wrap by artists to represent their interpretations, including



fiber, painting, photography, sculpture, and mixed media. All visitors will have an opportunity to help determine the People's Choice winner when they visit the exhibition between January 12 and February 12.

Running in conjunction with Local Color in our second gallery will be **Wooly Wonders**, featuring the work of multiple fiber artists who participated in the year-long Wooly Wonders project. This "sheep to shawl" experience was funded by the Wyoming Foundation, a grant administered by the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo. You will see garments or accessories made from animal fibers created by these fiber artists.

The year-long project took these artists to local farms to learn about types of wool. Then they learned to clean, prepare, spin, and knit or crochet their own items to be showcased in the exhibition.

Both shows will open on Friday, January 12, and end with a closing reception on February 23, 6:30 - 8:00 pm. The reception will feature artists' talks, music, and presentation of awards. Come and share in the celebration as we recognize the accomplishments of our local artists and kick off a new and $oldsymbol{DIFFERENT}$ year!

GLOW TRADITIONS NEWS

Karen Canning, GLOW Traditions Director

Linda Franke and Elise Kelly, Artists in Residence at Warsaw Elementary School

"What is something you've learned over the years about being a fiber artist?"

"Why is the rose your favorite crochet pattern to make?

"What is Irish lace?"

"What is Eastern style square dancing?"

"Does it matter what song you dance to?"

"Why do you have to hold hands?"

4th grade art classes and 5th grade music classes at Warsaw Elementary asked Linda Franke and Elise Kelly these questions, and many more, during the artists' residencies this fall. Art teacher, Holly Hosmer, and music teachers, Sydney Wiseman and Guy Macaluso, guided students as they interviewed the artists, learning about family connections to these regional traditions and why the artists continue to practice them. Art students used multiple media to document the experience through original artwork, including portraiture, word art, and crocheted bracelets. Music students learned basic dance figures, discovering the added fun of dancing to live music. The program design allowed students to get to know the artists over several visits, deepening their engagement with them and the art forms. The program was funded by a grant from the Conable Foundation, to support arts in education in Wyoming County.





Announcing our TravelStorys Cell Phone Tour

GLOW Traditions is thrilled to announce our new cell phone tour, available on a free downloadable app from TravelStorys.com. Titled Genesee Valley Back Story, the tour is part of a series developed by Nancy Solomon, folklorist and Director of Long Island Traditions, to highlight traditional culture across New York state. Utilizing audio interview recordings and photographs from public folklore collections (such as ours), the tours bring "first person" accounts of regional traditions to travelers and residents alike. We've been working on the project over the past 2 years, creating a six-stop tour that stretches across the GLOW region. The northern part traverses several stops along the Erie Canal, exploring Mexican customs in Medina with Gladys Rosario; the sandstone quarrying legacy in Albion with Norma and Virginia DiLaura; and memories of Holley's "Little Italy" with Archie Charles. ACWC YOUTH PERFORMING ARTS SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is awarded once each year to one high school student who wishes to further their studies in the performing arts. The grants (up to \$500) may be used to help with summer music camp fees or ongoing lessons from a professioms teacher or institution. Recipients of this scholarship are expected to perform at select ACWC events throughout the year, including the Community Arts Grants Awards Ceremony that is held in March, where the award is presented.

It is awarded each year to one high school student who wishes to further their studies in visual arts: photography, fiber arts, ceramics, carpentry, drawing or painting.

Valued at \$900, the scholarship is a one-year apprenticeship to a local master in fine arts or crafts, culminating with an exhibition of work produced under the master.
